- c) Consider a <u>parallel plate</u> capacitor with the same capacitance and same separation between plates as the spherical capacitor. What must be the area of each plate in the parallel plate capacitor for this condition to be met? How much electric-field energy is stored between the plates if the magnitude of charge on each plate is 5.5 nC?
